Front Entrance Sign Update: President Holly Grotzinger

As noted in prior communications, we do not own the frontage land to Haywood Knolls. Our jurisdiction begins at the stream/park area. Conserving Carolina owns the land that fronts the neighborhood and they have agreed to lease the land to HKA for our permanent entrance sign. It will be a 99 year lease for \$1/yr. This will save us a lot of time and money vs. buying a piece of their land, which has many issues attached to that course of action.

- Temporary neighborhood entrance sign installed and lighted
- DOT to begin clearing all trees/brush/etc along Hwy 191 this Fall 2024
- Road construction slated for Fall 2025

Construction of our permanent entrance cannot begin until all the road work is completed.

Newhall Park

History...The Haywood Knolls community's common area, approximately two acres in size, was given to the Haywood Knolls Association in 1991 by the original developer Donald Thompson. Bordered on one side by Mill Creek, the common area also boasts a picnic area with tables and a several hundred foot trail around the tennis/basketball courts. This common area was named Newhall Park in 1991 after Harvey Newhall, a Past President of the Haywood Knolls Association, for his legacy to the community. He always had a willing and enthusiastic hand in making life better for all the residents and encouraged others to do so as well. It is only fitting that Newhall Park bears his name for "service above and beyond."

Seminars in the Park

HKA is featuring several seminars at the Park with interesting and informative speakers. It is also a chance to meet and get to know other neighbors.



"Overcoming Stress and Burnout" - 7/20 Newhall Park – This seminar/workshop was led by neighbor and local trauma therapist.

For those that missed out...some Key points

First we learned about the brain...& how it affects the body under stress:

- In survival mode you can fight (verbal or physical aggression), flight (run away) or freeze (hide). And 1 more but we can't give it all away...
- "I don't have time for this!" This thought signals that there is a threat -body reactions associated with a sense of urgency, worry, tension, heart racing, pupils dilate, rest-digest-repair processes halt. Stress, over time can make you more forgetful, disorganized, agitated, racing thoughts, projecting anger, frustration, blaming others, excessive worry & feeling not in control. When your body can no longer sustain this, it crashes. Exhausted, filled with guilt & shame at how you've responded, isolated, hopeless & helpless, procrastinated and lack of motivation.

Then we learned about Coping:

- HALT Hungry, Angry, Lonely, Tired When feeling distress, check in and make sure you have eaten/hydrated, tended to your emotions, connected with someone or something and rested. Then re-evaluate the situation.
- Have routines that protect time for the things that are priorities for you.
- Show up for yourself as you do for others.
- **Grounds in the moment- bring** your attention to your breath and the things you notice around you. What do you see, hear, smell, taste, touch?
- Get your body moving
- Paced breath- take a breath through your nose and imagine your belly is a balloon that you are slowly filling, all the way to the top of your throat, s-l-o-w-l-y release your breath through you pursed lips (imaging a balloon squeaking the air out.) Breathing out through your mouth, relaxes your jaw and sends another message to the brain that you are now safe.
- Heart breath- imagine the air around you is full of bright energy. Breathe in and bring the light to your heart space, breath out and release tension.
 Do this two or three times to fill yourself up.
- Safe place visualization- go to a positive memory that makes you feel warm and calm. The beach, a cozy cottage in the woods, a mountain top, a favorite vacation...Think about it in great detail, what do you see, hear, smell, touch, taste? Your body will remember how that memory felt and trick your brain into thinking you are there!

Wildlife Watch - Groundhogs

HKA is loaded with beautiful wild animals but some of them are major pests! Groundhogs are cute but tricky and devious fellows. They are known to create a burrow on your property and can eat through an entire garden overnight! They are often referred to as a woodchuck, a name derived from the Indian word "wuchak."

Groundhogs have broad rounded bodies with short powerful legs and short, flat, bushy tails. White incisors protrude from their mouths. They are generally brown, grayish-brown, or reddish-brown in color. Adult body sizes range from 16-32 inches long and their tails from 3-10 inches long. Weights vary from 4-14 pounds. They typically live in underground burrows and hibernate over the winter. Burrow systems are complex with tunnels up to 50 ft in length. They are good swimmers and can also climb trees and fences to escape danger. Groundhogs are considered a nuisance because they forage on crops and gardens and burrow on people's properties. As such, they can be hunted year-round and have no bag limit, so they may be removed at any time via approved hunting methods.

Trapping Groundhogs for removal

In residential areas where use of firearms is prohibited, trapping may be an option. Groundhogs may be trapped during the <u>regulated trapping season</u>, or outside of the trapping season by acquiring a free permit from the NC Wildlife Resources. Also, licensed <u>Wildlife Control Agents</u> can remove them for a fee. Groundhogs cannot be relocated in North Carolina. Trapped groundhogs must be either euthanized or released at the site of capture.

Other deterrents

To protect small areas (gardens and under buildings) from groundhog destruction, simple fencing about 3-4-foot-high of hardware cloth or chicken wire with a 1-foot

underground footer and at least 1 foot at the top that will wobble when the woodchuck attempts to climb it. A single strand of electric wire 4 inches off the ground on the outside of a non-electric fence can provide additional deterrence. Motion-detecting sprinklers can also be used to deter groundhogs from small areas. The best time to install groundhog barriers is in the early spring (March) when they are first emerging from their winter dens, or in late summer after young are weaned (August).

Wild Animal Distemper in Our Area

It has been reported that there have been several sightings of raccoons displaying signs of distemper. We had four reports in the lower section of Haywood Knolls. In addition, the Sheriff's department noted that another subdivision off Rugby reported the same.

Distemper is a highly fatal virus that affects raccoons, foxes, coyotes, weasels, etc and dogs! It can impact their respiratory and nervous systems. It's caused by a single-stranded RNA virus, and can't be spread to humans. However, it can spread to dogs through the environment or airborne exposure and is fatal within 24-48 hrs.

Symptoms of distemper in wildlife and dogs include:

- Discharge from the eyes and nose, and a rough coat of hair.
- Convulsions, seizures, coughing, diarrhea, vomiting, and glowing green eyes.
- Acting friendly or passive, being active during the day, wandering aimlessly, appearing blind or confused, stumbling or moving slowly, falling over, or circling aimlessly.
- Emaciated appearance, bloated appearance, unusual hair loss patterns.

Symptoms can worsen over time and the animal may appear calm as the disease progresses, but can become aggressive if approached too closely.

If you see an animal that you think has distemper, you should not approach or feed it. Call the Henderson Animal Control County handled by the Sheriff's department 828-697-4982 to report the issue. Also, take in any bird feed/feeders and pet food. Keep trash cans secured. Actions are so we don't encourage raccoons to come closers to humans.

Want to own a piece of Haywood Knolls History?



Our beautiful old monuments that have stood at the entrance for 40 years had to be demolished as the DOT now owns that land. Volunteers worked to save special plants, trees and stacked stone for our park and new permanent sign. The Haywood Knolls temporary sign will stay up until we have a new front entrance.

In the process, we salvaged some of the letters and the four lights that stood atop the monuments. Thinking some of our residents might want to own a piece of Haywood Knolls' history, we will be offering them at a silent auction at the Annual Meeting on September 17th - 7pm @ French Broad Baptist Church.
