#### Wildlife Watch - Bear Sightings and Snakes

Our neighborhood is full of wild animals, especially BEARS! It has been an active year for them as so many of their habitats are being destroyed as we add new homes and road construction.

## Black Snakes and Copperheads ... the Good, the Bad and the Ugly (well both are?)

There have been a lot of sightings of black snakes and copperheads in the neighborhood.

So, here's the inside scoop in case you don't know that some snakes are GOOD.



#### **Black Rat Snakes**

<u>Appearance</u>: Black rat snakes can reach 8 feet in length. They have slender bodies, are **non-venomous**, and can subdue their prey via constriction. As adults, they are primarily black except for a small amount of white between their scales and on their chin and throat. Their average lifespan in the wild is 10 to 15 years.

<u>Range</u>: Black rat snakes can be found throughout the east coast from southern Vermont to Florida. They can be found in hard-wood forests, swamps, timbered upland, farmland, barns, and old fields.

<u>Behavior:</u> They are most active during the day, but still prefer to stay nearby protective cover. Black rat snakes hibernate in the winter, often with other snakes such as the venomous rattlesnake or copperhead.

<u>Diet</u>: Black rat snakes are **excellent for pest control**, preying mostly on rodents. Black rat snakes are great climbers, which helps them ascend rafters and trees to prey on mice and even bird eggs and squirrels.



#### American Copperhead

The copperhead is a pit viper and the **most common venomous snake in North Carolina**. They are often the only venomous snake in urban areas. Copperheads are responsible for more than 90% of venomous snakebites in the state, and North Carolina Poison Control receives about 10 times more calls about copperheads than any other snake.

<u>Appearance</u>: Copperheads are rather heavy-bodied and are beautifully marked with dark brown, hourglass shaped cross bands on a light brown or gray background. The belly is a mix of white and black markings. They average around 3 ft but can grow up to 4.5 ft. Baby copperheads look like their parents but have yellow or green tails that they wiggle to lure lizards and frogs within striking range.

<u>Range</u>: Copperheads are common in many forested areas but sometimes venture into open fields. They are rather tolerant of human development and can often be found in established, wooded neighborhoods. The <u>North Carolina</u> <u>Wildlife Resources Commission says</u> that copperheads prefer areas with both cover and sun for basking, such as woodland edges. They can often be found in stacks of firewood, trash dumps, under steps, leaf piles, etc.

<u>Behavior</u>: Copperheads are active from April to November and usually active at night but can often be found moving around or basking during the daytime. In the mountains, they sometimes hibernate with timber rattlesnakes.

<u>Diet</u>: Adult Copperheads often use ambush tactics to capture a variety of prey including mice, small birds, insects, and frogs.

WATCH OUT! When disturbed, copperheads will frequently vibrate their tail and release musk from glands at the base of their tail. If severely threatened, copperheads will usually bite to defend themselves. Poison Control says that about half of all bites result only in pain and mild swelling. Of course, you should still contact NC Poison Control or a medical professional immediately if bitten. Copperhead bite to a pet can be fatal, especially small dogs, depending on the bite's severity and the animal's size. If your dog is bitten by a copperhead, you should:

- Stay calm
- Minimize movement
- Call your vet and/or take your dog to an emergency veterinary clinic immediately
- Bring your pet for evaluation even if you're unsure if the snake is venomous
