The tear-down of the old monuments continues while we work with Conserving Carolina to acquire the space needed for our new sign. We have staked out the general area. In addition, we are working on a new logo for our neighborhood. No new information from DOT - utility work has started; road work is set for early 2025.

Comments posted on Next Door noted confusion and anger that we are tearing the signs down now. Instead of posting on ND - please just reach out to me for answers. The answer is ...

We must remove them now as they are owned by the DOT, and they directed us to remove them NOW if we intend to re-use the stones. As advised by our architect and masons, we can and will reuse the stone to save money on the construction of the new sign.

COMING SOON - we will put up a temporary sign with a floodlight as I know lighting our entrance can be an issue on a dark night. Thank you for your patience and thank you to the volunteers that have helped with demolition and moving all the plants to the park. We will be moving the red maple as well but lack equipment so it will take longer.

Wildlife Watch - Long Tailed Weasel

Our neighborhood is full of wild animals - just watch the YouTube videos from one of our residents @WildlifeBehindOurHome. Recently spotted was the elusive Long-Tailed Weasel.

They are cute, curious, and lively but it's one of nature's most ferocious predators and is known as "nature's psychopath"! Due to their pattern of hunting and fearless attitude about attacking large animals, they kill more prey than they need at the time for future consumption.

- <u>Size:</u> Length 22 inches and weighs about 10 oz for larger male.
- <u>Habitat</u>: North and South America evolved nearly 2 million years ago. Found in temperate or tropical climates. They nest in hollow logs, rock piles and under barns.
- <u>Color</u>: Black in the daytime; Glow emerald green in a nighttime spotlight Their summer fur is brown with whitish underparts.
- <u>Behaviors</u>: LT Weasels drag and rub their body over surfaces to mark their territory and to scare predators away. They are not social and live apart from each other except in mating season. Excellent swimmers and climbers. Most active at night.
- <u>Die</u>t: They are carnivorous eaters, mostly rodents but will also eat birds, bird eggs, lizards, and fruit. Eating about 40 percent of their body weight every day as they have a high metabolic rate! If food is scarce, they have been known to kill and eat the siblings or offspring. Yikes! They do help control the population of rabbits and rodents.
- <u>Hunting</u>: Quick, alert, and agile, they hunt by detecting scent or sound of their prey. They follow their prey and attack with a bite at the base of the animal's skull.
- <u>Mating</u>: They are polygynous one male mates with many females. Mating is mid-summer. Birth takes about 280 days, and a litter is typically six pups or kits.

Fun Fact:

North Carolina Native Americans deemed the long-tailed weasel to be a bad sign and crossing its path meant a speedy death.
