While WNC will be forever changed by Helene - our own community changed as well - for humans AND for our wildlife - the support, camaraderie, and kindness of total strangers working every day to rebuild is amazing.

#### **Debris Removal Continues**

Henderson County is continuing to work with contractors to pick up all storm debris on DOT, municipal and private roads. Storm debris that is pushed to the right of way of a property will be picked up. Please be patient. Debris will be up picked by us as soon as possible. Residents will need to place all items along the road right of way in order for pickup. Storm debris includes tree branches, leaves, logs, building materials, furniture, paint, etc. Please separate household garbage, construction debris, vegetative debris, large appliances, electronics and hazardous waste to expedite the removal process. There is no need to take storm debris to the Transfer Station. The best way to remove debris is to place it on your curb. FEMA/DOT is also currently cutting damaged trees and limbs that are overhanging the road easement all around the neighborhood. They don't have a pattern so if there is still debris on parts of your street left over they will be back to clean it up. DOT work will continue for the next several months until it is all picked up. Thank you for your patience.

Have storm debris from Hurricane Helene ready for free curbside pickup? You can use this online form to report your debris to the County. With this form you can describe the type of storm debris and submit photos, which will help plan cleanup efforts.

#### **Covenants Corner**

HKA has covenants rather than deed restrictions. This allows for more flexibility for residents but these RULES help keep the neighborhood looking more

harmonious and beautified and protect our property values. In addition, it keeps HKA in compliance with Henderson County and NC State laws. Please review the attached simplified version of our Covenants and use it as your reference. The official version filed with the County is on our HKA website.

#### HAYWOOD KNOLLS ASSOCIATION, INC.

Restrictive Covenants Summary June 21, 2011

- 1. Plumbing only inside dwelling.
- 2a. Once residence per lot.

2b. A garage, utility or tool shed may be constructed within specific guidelines and with written permission from the Association. 3a. No other detached building may be erected.

3b. No temporary structure may be used as a permanent residence.

No temporary structure may be used as a permanent residence.
 4a. No manufacturing or commercial enterprise of any kind is permitted.

4b. No lot shall be used in a way that would injuriously affect the value of adjoining or adjacent premises.

No animals shall be maintained on the property except domestic pets.
 No billboard shall be maintained except a suitable sign for sale of the premises.

7. Minimum square feet of living space is required.

8. Minimum setback for front and side yards is required.

9. Any lot owner, or the Haywood Knolls Association, Inc. may institute legal proceedings to enforce the covenants.

10. The North Carolina Department of Transportation, the public utility, and the cable TV companies have a 60 foot right of way, 30 feet from the center of the street.

- There are 8 foot utility easements along the rear and side lot lines.
  No lot shall be subdivided unless the resulting lots comply with all zoning regulations.
- 13. No lot shall be maintained as a dumping ground.

14. Trucks larger than pickups, construction vehicles, RV's, travel or other trailers, boats and boat trailers not stored in a garage must be parked in the rear of the premises.

15. All residences erected may be one family dwellings only.

16. The Board of Directors of Haywood Knolls Association, Inc. retains the right to grant minor variances to any of the restrictions.

17. The covenants shall take effect upon recordation, shall remain in effect for a period of twenty years, and shall be automatically extended for successive periods of ten years, unless and until terminated or amended by an affirmative vote of Fifty-One (51%) per cent of the membership.

#### Wildlife Watch - Don't forget to feed the birds!

Feeding birds in the winter is important because it helps them survive the cold months and scarce food supplies:

- **Survival**: Birds need to gain fat for insulation and energy and feeding them can increase their chances of survival.
- **Protect crops**: Birds eat garden pests, which can help protect crops.
- **Enjoy nature**: Bird feeding can be a great way to enjoy bird watching.

Here are some tips for feeding birds in the winter:

- **Provide a variety of foods**: Offer foods high in fat, like nyjer seeds, white millet, black oil sunflower seeds, striped sunflower seeds, and cracked corn.
- **Protect food from the elements**: Hang feeders 5 to 6 feet above the ground near cover, like trees, shrubs, and brush piles.
- Choose a squirrel-proof feeder
- **Clean feeders regularly**: Clean feeders with a 10% non-chlorinated bleach solution when you notice moldy, wet seeds and droppings.
- **Provide clean water**: Freshen the water every other day, if possible.
- **Be consistent**: Continue feeding birds through late winter and early spring.
- **Provide shelter**: Offer brush piles or bird nest boxes for shelter from winter storms.

You can also plant native plants to support birds. For example, native oaks and cherries support the larval stage of insects, while seed and fruit trees like black cherry, eastern red cedar, maples, and blackgum provide food for birds. In addition, many of your plants and wildflowers that appear "dead" or "dried out" can provide an excellent source of food for birds - such as Coneflowers, Sweet Joe-Pye Weed, Sunflowers, Coreopsis, Beautyberry, etc.

## **Conserving Carolina Trails Remain Closed**

Our trails are located in some of the areas that were hardest hit by floods and landslides. All Conserving Carolina trails are closed at this time. In some cases, roads to the trailheads are badly damaged or gone altogether. Local residents are doing everything they can to come back from some of the worst impacts of this terrible storm. The last thing they need are crowds of people coming out on damaged roads, attempting to hike unsafe trails, and potentially placing more demands on already overstretched fire and rescue squads.

Community events have been suspended through the end of the year and our community engagement team has pivoted to help our land management team address impacts from the storm. All of our regular volunteer workdays have been suspended for now. First, we want to assess impacts on our properties and we want to ensure the safety of our volunteers.

However, in the coming months, we will need a *lot* of help from volunteers, especially with repairing our trails.
